


















## School in Focus – Hartlebury CE Primary School

## Hartlebury students inspired by Baxter College musicians





## Baxter College's Record of Achievement Launch

On 30 January, Baxter College launched their Year 7 Record of Achievement, with a large careers event, involving people from a range of careers and businesses. Organisations including Nationwide, DWP, Involve, HS2, University of Birmingham, Vax, MUUF, NTT Data, Wardell Armstrong, West Mercia Police, Worcester University and Birmingham Children's Hospital, were all represented at the event. Each visitor met with every tutor group where they explained a little about their job, and what they did, then students had the opportunity to ask visitors further questions about their career. The year 7s demonstrated some excellent listening and questioning skills.

Their support meant that all year 7 students had a meaningful encounter with an employer. Research from the Education and Employers Taskforce shows that a young person who has four or more meaningful encounters with an employer is 86% less likely to be unemployed or not in education or training and can earn up to 22% more during their career. This event will also act as evidence for the pupil's Record of Achievement which will be used to collate all the experiences and opportunities the year 7 get to participate in at Baxter College.

### St Bartholomew's visit Cadbury World

Year 4 visited Cadbury World recently and when they arrived they were greeted with the delicious smell that was, of course, chocolate. It was just delightful.

In the factory, there are robots working instead of people, because people are full of germs and cannot work 24 hours straight like the machines do. Did you know 1.3 million Cadbury's crème eggs are made every day? Cadbury's chocolate is made from cocoa powder, cocoa butter, dairy milk and sugar beet. The students saw how John Cadbury and his family built up their factory and looked after their workers. They even got to try some liquid chocolate – yummy! They finished their day in the 4D cinema, which was amazing and were all given chocolate to take home.










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## SAET Basketball Academy

## **Critical Thinking for Greater Depth Learning**

Year 5 and 6 students from across the Trust were involved in a critical thinking workshop on Wednesday 13 February, ably supported by Year 12 student ambassadors from Stourport High VI<sup>th</sup> Form College. During the morning, students had to work closely with others from all five of our Trust primaries to discuss, agree and explain their understanding on a wide range of topics. In addition to transferring and applying their learning in different contexts and subject areas, all students were challenged to think differently and use their ideas to make connections with other areas of learning. Students had to solve a dilemma regarding The Stone of Scone; apply a deeper understanding of different words relating to a range of different smells through metaphor, similes and synonyms; and apply higher order thinking skills to survive on the moon.

Well done to everyone involved who demonstrated their ability to apply skills and knowledge independently, confidently and fluently.





#### **Acting Workshop at Baxter College**

Some students at Baxter have had an amazing opportunity to work with two professional actors, who are part of an improvisation group called 'The Imploectuals'. This group performed a range of improvised scenes to live audiences who decided on the content of their performances.

Skills required for this style of performance work is mainly based on the ability to think on the spot and having the confidence to try ideas. During the workshops, students were able to take part in activities which developed a number of skills, such as, confidence, pushing literacy skills, supporting others, developing creativity and memory skills. Students were really engaged and supportive throughout the workshop and both actors said that the students were a pleasure to work with. Well done to all those who took part.

## SHS Students Preparing for a Trip of a Lifetime...





Four students from Stourport High School will be heading to Peru this summer on a once-in-a-lifetime expedition with Camps International. Year 12 student Mathew Davies along with Year 10 students Sophie Gallagher, Katie Potter and Alfie Myers, will be part of a larger group involving students from North Bromsgrove High School and Barr Beacon School, Walsall. Together, the group will spend four weeks in Peru flying out from Heathrow on Wednesday 10 July. This amazing opportunity will involve two weeks working with the local people on different community and environmental projects plus spending a week at Lake Titicaca. The final week will involve the ultimate challenge of trekking the spectatcular Salkantay Trial to the sacred ancient ruins of Macchu Picchu, through the world-famous Andes mountain range.

Aside from having the opportunity to visit a truly inspiring country, students have had to develop their entrepreneurial skills plus budgeting, time-keeping and priotising their workload in order to raise their fundraising target of £4,350. Each student has individually raised over £3,500 and have a few months left to reach their goal. Students have worked tirelessly to gain support from local businesses, friends and family through sponsorship and donations whilst committing a substantial amount of time and energy to raise money through raffles, car boot sales, cake sales and paid work. #### **Alternative Curriculum at SHS**



A group of students from Stourport High School were involved in a Crime Investigation workshop recently, as part of a series of alternative curriculum activities, in association with our Trust and Explore Learning.

Students developed their spoken language and writing skills through different tasks based around solving and dealing with a crime scene. Students needed to ask relevant questions to extend their understanding before writing and presenting their findings through role play.

The group will be visiting Explore Learning in Stourbridge soon to improve their letter writing skills specifically in relation to writing effectively for the purpose of an audience. They will have to select and organise key facts and apply their knowledge of vocabulary and grammar.

In addition, the group are in the process of setting up their own small business within school with the aim of selling Easter products. They are working as a team to develop their enterprise skills and their understanding of market research, marketing and profit and loss. Watch this space for further details!

#### **Army Cadets at Baxter College**

An Army Cadet Forces unit will be set up at Baxter College to provide young people with the chance to develop self-discipline and improve their teamwork and leadership skills. Baxter has been given Ministry of Defence and Department for Education approval to run a unit to offer a range of activities for personal development.

Delighted Principal Mr Carpenter said the ethos of such units had been shown to make "significant contributions to changing many young people's lives for the better". He added: "They are known, not only to bring benefits to the cadets themselves, but also to the wider ethos and performance of the schools in which they parade." The unit will initially be open to Baxter College's Year 8 pupils, aged 12 and 13, from September this year.





















# **Screen Time for Children and Young People**



The Department of Health and Social Care (DHSC) has published a commentary from the UK Chief Medical Officers' on screen-based activities and the impact on children and young people's mental health and psychosocial wellbeing. In 2018, the UK Chief Medical Officers commissioned independent researchers at University College London to map published research on screen time, social media, and children and young people's mental health. Based on this review of the available research, this commentary includes advice for parents and carers, as well as recommendations for a range of stakeholders. The main points from the guidance are summarised below:

- Parents and carers are encouraged to agree boundaries, outside of school and educational use, with children and young people around online behaviours and time spent using screens. Studies have reported that children and young people are worried about their parent's screen use and want them to engage with them, and so adults can lead by example through not using screens excessively in front of children and behaving online as they would in person.
- UK Chief Medical Officers' advice for parents and carers on Children and Young People's screen and social media use:
  - Sleep matters Getting enough, good quality sleep is very important. Leave phones outside the bedroom when it is bedtime.
  - o *Education matters* Make sure you and your children are aware of, and abide by, their school's policy on screen time.
  - Safety when out and about Advise children to put their screens away while crossing the road or doing an activity that needs their full attention.
  - o Family time together Screen-free meal times are a good idea you can enjoy face-to-face conversation, with adults giving their full attention to children.
  - Sharing sensibly Talk about sharing photos and information online and how photos and words are sometimes manipulated. Parents and carers should never assume that children are happy for their photos to be shared. For everyone – when in doubt, don't upload!
  - o *Keep moving!* Everyone should take a break after a couple of hours sitting or lying down using a screen. It's good to get up and move about a bit. #sitlessmovemore
  - Talking helps Talk with children about using screens and what they are watching. A change in behaviour can be a sign they are distressed – make sure they know they can always speak to you or another responsible adult if they feel uncomfortable with screen or social media use.
  - Use helpful phone features Some devices and platforms have special features try using these
    features to keep track of how much time you (and with their permission, your children) spend
    looking at screens or on social media.
