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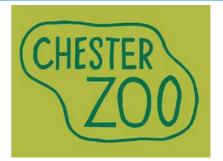






Learning from Home

We'd like to take this opportunity to share some of the excellent home learning that has taken place in the past two weeks and also, some of the excellent resources which are available to your children.

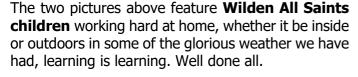

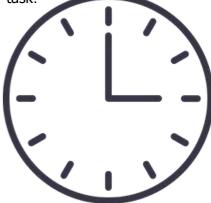






SHS's Mollie K's GCSE PE Revision Clocks

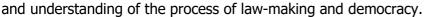

Parliamentary Visit – Primaries

Importance of Fire Safety

You should have working smoke alarms fitted on every level of your home. They give you vital time to 'get out, stay out and call 999' if ever you're unlucky enough to have a fire. And it's crucial that you test them regularly — we advise once a week.

With more people staying at home, we are asking everyone to be extra careful, to avoid fires happening in the first place...some top tips.

If you're at home because you're ill or self-isolating, please take extra care if you're cooking. Most house fires start in the kitchen. Always 'Watch what you heat'. Switch off any electrical items you're not using. If you use a charger, for a phone or laptop for example, don't leave it plugged in and switched on when you're asleep or not using it.

Candles should be secured safely in a proper holder and never left unattended. Same with a portable heater, remember not to put it close to things that could easily catch fire, like bedding, clothes, soft furnishings or curtains.

If you smoke, be extra vigilant. Keep matches and lighters away from

children, and double check that your cigarette is properly extinguished. Try not to smoke if you've been drinking alcohol, and avoid smoking in bed or if you're feeling sleepy. If you can do so safely, smoke outdoors. Whenever possible, especially when you're asleep, keep all internal doors closed. This helps to stop fire spreading. Plan and practice an escape plan and make sure everyone in the house is aware. If a fire does happen, don't be tempted to tackle it yourself. Get out (closing doors as you go), stay out and call 999. Please share these messages with friends and family, and check in with those who may be older and more vulnerable. St Bartholomew's CE VC Primary Students Learn the Importance of Water Safety

Children at St Bartholomew's have been learning about water safety from two rescue charities following the floods which claimed the life of a much-loved family member of one of the pupils. Many of the families of children at the school were hit by the floods, but none more so than that of 7-year-old pupil Alexander M whose grandad's partner, Yvonne Booth, was swept away when her car became stuck in Tenbury last month.

Pupils looked at the work of West Mercia Search and Rescue and the Severn Area Rescue Association (SARA) and designed posters promoting water safety. Mr James, Headteacher, said "some pupils will also be completing the West Mercia Search and Rescue water safety course which covers drowning, where and how they occur, hazards in water and the powerful effect of water generally including rivers, lakes and ponds. It's vital for our children growing up in a town with such a large river and canal flowing through it that they understand the dangers of water and how to stay safe. Alexander's grandad has also offered to come and talk to our children about his experience at a later date, which is incredibly brave and thoughtful of him."





SHS A-Level Progress is Best in Wyre Forest!

Latest figures reveal SHS's A-level results in 2019 topped the league table in Wyre Forest, with students making the best progress and the highest average grade across three A-levels.

Highlights included 100% pass rates at grades A* to C for students in fine art, English literature, history, religious studies, geography, film studies, media studies and business studies. Government statistics show a year on year improvement in progress for the school's sixth form since 2017 following the opening of the £3.5 million state-of-theart sixth form college.

Last summer's progress score of 0.08 was the best in Wyre Forest and also better than neighbouring Haybridge High School and Sixth Form, King Edward VI College, Stourbridge and Worcester Sixth Form College. Mr Sheers said "our sixth form college is a lively, stimulating and challenging learning environment in which our students are thriving. We have enjoyed some particularly outstanding results, and are extremely proud of our sixth formers, with ambitious students last year heading off to universities in pursuit of careers ranging from medicine and veterinary science to aeronautics.



Our BTEC students, choosing vocational courses, also achieved very well, with the average grade being a distinction. We were particularly delighted for our health and social care students, all of whom attained a distinction or distinction*. Our teachers are dedicated to providing the best education for our students and we are looking forward to similar – if not even better - levels of success for our current year 13 this summer, who will, of course, receive calculated grades, based on their hard work rather than final exams."
