

# Three Kings Parade



Covid-19 restrictions may have forced the cancellation of Stourport's annual Three Kings Parade and Christmas Lights switch on but children from St. Bartholomew's CE VE Primary School staged their own version of the popular celebration.

Pupils at St Bartholomew's Primary School, who prepare the kings, Gaspar, Melchior and Balthasar, each year for the town event, held their own parade on Tuesday (Dec 1), marking the start of Advent, before switching on festive lights in their classrooms

Teacher and senior leader Mrs Graham was determined the cancellation was not going to dampen their festive fun and set about organising the parade around the new mile-a-day track in the grounds.

Headtracher Mr James said: "St Bart's has been custodian of the three kings for several years and our children with teacher Mrs Watkins re-designed and constructed new models just two years ago to replace the ageing versions, so we have a very special affinity for them and what they signify, the start of Christmas time."

The parade coincided with a donation of £557 from Messy Church's Worship Wednesday Team which is unable to run under the current restrictions and chose to close their bank account and donate their funds.

Mr James added: "In addition to supporting with many of our Worship Group activities in school including Advent and nativity events, a large proportion of this very generous gift will go towards a project with Hen House Farm, which will include us nurting 20 eggs in an incubator and watching them hatch in time for Easter, as part of our science curriculum and church events."

The Messy Church, designed to encourage creativity, celebration and hospitality through God, has also donated £557 to Wilden All Saints CE Primary School, which along with St Bartholomews, is a member of Severn Academies Educational Trust family of schools.



## Christingle Christmas School Service



This year's Christmas Service at Stourport Primary was a bit different to their traditional Christmas Service which is normally held at St Michael's Church.

Using the school's classroom technology, they went virtual for this years' service with special guests Mr Hayes and Chair of Governors, Mrs Holmes joining in from their homes.

# Fantastic art created by Wilden pupils, taking inspiration from the Vikings and Glass Art!



This term at Wilden, year 6 have been learning all about The Ylkings and taking inspiration for curriculum subjects from our key text, Beowulf by Michael Morpurgo.

To link this into their art unit, they have been designing and developing skills to make their own stained glass windows with a Viking theme. They have worked on developing observational drawing skills (as it is important to be able to observe and replicate); so have studied the artist Henin Matisses and his technique of Painting with Scissors'; we have looked at the skills of craftsmen and women and how stained sjass windows are made and used all of these ideas and techniques to design and make their own.

They had to compose their design and use scissors skills to cut delicate pieces of coloured acetate to size! They then used relief paste and glass paint to create the final finish. It was tricky at times-but it was worth it!

## The Stourport Primary Mile a Day Challenge!



Over the last couple of weeks, the entire school has taken on the fitness challenge of each class walking a mile a day. Mr Yarranton, P.E. Co-Ordinator, has planned out the route which takes the children from Stourport Primary all the way to Bethlehem. It's planned that they will arrive at Bethlehem by the final day of term. This will be a total of 3165 miles altogether that the school will have walked.

All the children are enjoying this daily exercise and are very confident that they will reach their goal. During our weekly virtual assemblies, Mr Yarranton gives a progress update and displays on a map the progress that the children have made. In the first week they covered 720 miles which was the equivalent of walking from John O'Groats to just past Exeter and in week two an outstanding 1200 miles.
