This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated Primary PE and sport premium guidance.

Question	Stats:	Further context Relative to local challenges
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	83%	The cost of taking children swimming has increased significantly (cost of pool hires, swimming teachers and coach cost) and so we had to reduce the number of lessons this year to 10. In previous years, we have taken children for two terms or swimming rather than one which has often led to a larger percentage of children being able to swim over a 25m distance.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	83%	When we took children swimming last year, 23 out of 28 children could swim using a range of strokes.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	100%	When we took the children swimming, we ensured that all children took part in safe self-rescue lessons and all children were able to perform self-rescue in water-based situations.
